There is no doubt that 2020 was a challenging year for all of us. Together, we have faced the various difficulties associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. And while governments of different political persuasions, at both State and Federal level, have provided various forms of assistance, many Victorians who were already affected

by unemployment, low incomes, and the devastating impact of the Gippsland bushfires, have in many cases fallen further behind. We are mindful of this as we continue to advocate on behalf of those most severely impacted.

2020 also presented many people with the opportunity to remember and reconnect with the simple things in life. It has been a time where we could again recognise the most important things in life, the simple pleasures. Families reconnecting and communities canvassing to support local business and neighbourhoods. It was a time to focus on others besides ourselves—whether the elderly neighbour next door or the homeless person lying in the street. For many, it has also been a time of reawakening and the rediscovery of our own personal relationship with our Creator and the practicalities that spring from an opportunity of experiencing a deeper spiritual life.

They seek to alleviate the burdens facing refugees and asylum seekers, prisoners, those who may have become trapped into a life of addiction, as well as others who face discrimination and uncertainty in their everyday lives.

Chairperson's Report

Catholic Social Services Victoria (CSSV) is at a pivotal point in time. 2020 has seen a major strategic focus of CSSV Council on striving to shape the future of Catholic social services as a collaborative force within the life of the Church and as a credible and sustainable advocate for those who are most disadvantaged and vulnerable.

This has happened at a time of widening fracture lines in Australian social policies, a growing divide between rich and poor and more vocal public expressions of underlying frustrations with injustices in society.

Strong on our values and mission, our leadership role has been to embrace change and to engage as much as possible with the Archbishop, Bishops and member organisations. This has been happening at the same time as the executive director, staff and committees have valiantly carried out the planned program of activities of formation, advocacy and member support.

Most notably, the year commenced with a very successful national conference attended by over 290 people, and continued with member engagements such as the Mission Inspired Leadership program, albeit in digital formats.

On behalf of Council, I thank the many people who have been involved and supported the work of CSSV through the many forums, projects, committees and working groups as listed in this report. This very large voluntary contribution of time and resources is what produces the outcomes. These have been well documented in the CSSV newsletters throughout the year.

The big picture work has seen CSSV join with the Archbishop and Bishops of Victoria in reviewing the purpose, structure and funding of CSSV. Fr Frank Brennan SJ responded ably to the challenge of preparing a *Directions Paper* and consulted widely with members and bishops in preparation of this paper. The Paper includes a concise and coherent synopsis of the guidance provided by Pope Francis in a number of written directions. This provides a valuable springboard for forward movement.

CSSV has been strongly supported by the immense and active engagement of members throughout the consultation processes, notably as part of the review.

In the words of Chris Lowney, 'Leaders imagine an inspiring future and strive to shape it rather than passively watching the future happen around them. Heroes extract gold from the opportunities at hand rather than waiting for golden opportunities to be handed to them.'

CSSV and member organisations need the conviction and perseverance to ensure the continuity of the mission: To stand with and serve those who are poor, disadvantaged, marginalised and work for a just, equitable and compassionate society.

We collectively need to be open to transformation within the spirit of this mission, and to embrace change. Following the above consultation process, CSSV has produced and circulated a new 'value proposition' and is working on a new constitution, to be the vehicle to take us forward. CSSV is grateful for the guidance and support of the Bishops, and for their commitment to funding over this year and the next. This is based on us doing the work to address the funding imbalance which had grown over the years, and for the collective commitment of members to increase the necessary funding.

Our aim through the reform process is to reach a new consensus or partnership between all parties to be a contemporary active manifestation of the mission of the church, inspired by Pope Francis' guidance 'to have passion for the peripheries, be deeply missionary and have mercy as the cornerstone'. This work, still to be completed, will inform our strategic framework going forward, our relationships within the Church, and our active state-wide advocacy.

It is yet to be seen whether the Church can be relevant and have a collective voice on contemporary social policy matters and whether CSSV will be strong enough to have influence on public policy and the structural cause of disadvantage and inequality. Can we transform, read the signs of our times, and boldly seek to be the 'hands and feet' of Jesus in the modern world?

With good grace, and collective commitment, we can be optimistic, standing strong on our values and mission, and over the next year producing a coherent and sustainable plan for the future.

Executive Director's Report

The year of 2020 has been one of learning, listening, responding and adapting. Things that have been considered fundamental to social services work have been challenged, virtual environments have become second nature, and Australia has seen its first recession in years. I have been struck with admiration for our member organisations and

their staff as they have creatively continued their much-needed work of service in such challenging circumstances.

Although we didn't realise it at the time, the 2020 national Catholic social services conference in late February, where 105 groups and organisations were represented, was the last large-scale face-to-face gathering many would be a part of for the rest of the year. The theme 'Serving Communities with Courage and Compassion' would take on new, perhaps prophetic, meaning: the conference grounded our focus on what, why and how we should, or could, be going about our work of service in 2020.

For an umbrella organisation like Catholic Social Services Victoria (CSSV), the pandemic has meant that a balance needed to be struck between maintaining active consultation with our member organisations, responding to the new challenges of our sector, and working on our collaboratively built pre-existing priorities. With thanks to strong leadership from the Council, CSSV has been able to be on the front foot throughout 2020, recognising early that the effects of the pandemic had a broad ranging impact, but particularly compounded pre-existing social issues.

This meant that CSSV's core strategic priorities and focus were right on point, but there was added urgency and scale. Broad consultation with member organisations and the wider Catholic community has been vital, and we have brought together agencies to work through, understand and respond to specific COVID-19 issues such as the intersection of social services with unemployment/underemployment, mental health, the aged care workforce, and the public housing lockdown.

The 42 CSSV convened meetings of working groups and committees throughout the 2020 year is a testament to the dedication of our members and the broader Catholic community to work together, share expertise and collaborate to build a just and compassionate society.



Clergy, Religious and parishioners alongside staff from education, health and social service sectors have contributed their time generously to our shared work, to which I am truly grateful. The richness of experience, knowledge and perspective found in these efforts are the basis for effective advocacy and work towards positive transformation of ourselves and society; CSSV has worked hard to be a platform for this important intersection.

A highlight of 2020 was finalising a research report into aged care provision within the Victorian justice system. This report drew on support from across Catholic social services, education and health, and uncovered overlap with care needs of disabled prisoners. This report provides a solid platform for ongoing work to ensure the care needs of some of society's most vulnerable are met.

2020 also saw the groundwork laid for a responsive research project developed in conjunction with Australian Catholic University, which will assist us in documenting and preparing for the ongoing challenges that Catholic social service organisations face in light of the pandemic, which will assist our member organisations think through possible future work challenges and directions.

I am grateful to the team of staff and volunteers of CSSV, who continually go above and beyond to support this shared endeavor and keep so much of the varied work moving along. I am sure that many will join me in particularly thanking Peter Hudson who, after over seven years working with CSSV, finished with us in early 2020.

Pope Francis writes in *Let Us Dream* that 'We can reorganise the way we live together in order to better choose what matters. We can work together to achieve it. We can learn what takes us forward, and what sets us back. We can choose.' I am privileged to work alongside people and organisations humbly choosing to respond to and further explore this challenge. I look forward to continuing in being a part of this shared 'choice'.

Notes

Financial contributions from all Dioceses, member organisations and stakeholders towards the ongoing operations of Catholic Social Services Victoria (CSSV) are very much appreciated.

CSSV generated an operating surplus of \$123,077 for the 2020 year. There were a number of outcomes on the revenue and expenditure side that contributed to the 2020 result.

The net result for 2020 includes the collated surplus from Catholic social service conferences of \$58,556 which is available for utilisation on future Catholic social service conferences. This conference surplus amount is jointly owned and administered by CSSV and Catholic Social Services Australia, who have partnered to convene the regular conferences. It is through the incredible support of sponsors, and the generosity of time from volunteers, speakers and the conference organising committee that the 2020 CSSV conference was able to be delivered so successfully and economically.

Revenue

There has been changes in 2020 to CSSV funding arrangements, and during 2020 the regional Victorian Dioceses significantly increased their contribution to CSSV, and membership fees were also significantly increased to respond to this new arrangement.

- The Archdiocese of Melbourne is the largest contributor to CSSV's income, which at \$200,000 in 2020, was 32% of total income.
- The Diocese of Ballarat contributed \$36,000, the Diocese of Sale \$30,000 and the Diocese of Sandhurst \$36,000, to total \$102,000, which comes to 16% of total income.
- Membership fees for 2020 amounted to \$116,641 which is 19% of total income.
- Other income rose for 2020 to \$201,541. This relates to sales and sponsorship associated with the 2020 conference and includes the balance of the \$56,262 surplus of the 2018 Catholic social services conference, which was brought over into CSSV income for 2020.

Expenditure

Total expenditure for 2020 was \$497,105, which is \$41,124 less than in 2019. This decrease was largely due to COVID-19 implications, which delayed staff recruitment and other cost-cutting measures within the organisation. This drop in expenditure is significant as 2020 was a conference year.
